Presidents Soapbox:

I have just finished reading a book, Shop Class as Soulcraft, by Matthew Crawford. The author is a PhD philosopher turned motorcycle mechanic, who muses on various aspects of work as he sees them from his unique perspective. He is not really assigning virtue to the blue collar vs. the paper-pushers, or the manual artist over the dreamer. In the end, I think he is trying to clarify what contributes to a meaningful life in our modern society which seems to extoll freedom from work, "laborsaving", or the disposable vs. having to repair things. There are so many great insights, I am not really doing justice to the book in this short summary. The book triggered memories of the time I spent at the demonstration station at the Science Center. The frequently heard comment was, "Ham radio? My grandfather used to do that but I didn't think it still existed. Now that we have the internet (or cell phones), why would anyone do that today? What's the point?" Our Society has provided us with

relatively inexpensive, plug-andplay, essentially disposable (no one ever actually repairs a cell phone), means for communicating with others.

There are probably nearly as many answers to that question as there are Hams. Like Crawford, I think freedom from effort is not the ultimate goal we have been led to believe. Making an effort at something that we choose, defines us as individuals. Further, any achievement, regardless of the subject, may be a source of personal pride when shared in a community of people who can appreciate the effort expended. Each of us chooses his/her own challenge. It is part of what makes us individuals. One of the things that makes Ham Radio such a great sport, is the sheer number of different facets where effort may be applied. Even though the government has abandoned it, CW is still worthwhile for some Hams to struggle to master. That mastery is then shared with a certain community of like-minded people. I struggle to understand the electronics internal to the radio. I harbor the fantasy that one day I will successfully design and build a radio from scratch—and it will work. Some have invested great effort in providing communications service to public events or in planning for the disasters we all hope will never come. For some, getting that rare country in the log is a point of pride that can be shared with other dxers. And so on.

So there are two points to all this. First, no effort is wasted, no matter what the rest of society says. I don't know what brought each of you to Ham Radio and it doesn't really matter. What does matter, is that you made the effort. Never let someone else tell vou something is "not worth the effort". Only you can make that decision. Second, sharing our successes and failures in the smaller community of likeminded individuals helps give the effort meaning, and push us to new achievements. I always love it when people announce at the beginning of a meeting that they are newly licensed or recently upgraded, and everyone else applauds. I think it is an important function of the DMRAA to help



DMRAA's Youngest Member is 9 years-old!

Nolan Boeckmann, 9, may be just shy of being as tall as a quarter-wave antenna cut for 6 meters. But his interest in amateur radio measures up, being the only licensed amateur radio operator among his friends at school.

The fourth-grader from Ankeny, now bearing the callsign KDØJUO, became interested in amateur radio after watching his father, Brad, KC9DMQ, use amateur radio. Nolan was always interested in scanning the public safety bands. Listening to the Iowa State Patrol was one of his top interests

After Brad enticed Nolan to the Perry Winter RF Fest in February with the promise of donuts for break-

fast, Nolan obliged. After some friendly harassment from Mike Blaser, KCØMTE, at the hamfest, Nolan began to think a little bit more about amateur radio.

'how old do you
have to be to get

Brad recalled from
the hamfest. "I
knew then he got
'the bug.""

In between completing his schoolassigned homework

and competing in Taekwondo – which he has earned a red belt in – he put his nose in some amateur radio study guides over approximately six weeks to earn his technician-level amateur radio license.

Nolan drew information from the KB6NU study guides and online practice tests, and reviewed any trouble questions with his father. Brad and Nolan recalled one of the more difficult aspects of the test was the memorization of repeater offsets, but studying for the test wasn't much different

than studying for a test at school, Nolan said.

After Nolan felt comfortable enough to take the test, he tested at the DMRAA Hamfest in April and passed. Not too long after, he joined the DMRAA as the club's youngest member.

Each day after that, Nolan would check the FCC database for his callsign. The Friday after the DMRAA Hamfest, he was finally assigned his callsign.

"After he passed the test, he'd come home Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, checking the ULS every day after school," Brad said. "Friday he gets his first contact. He said he was a little nervous putting his call out for the first time. The first to come back to him was Tom Reis, NØVPR. Bob Dittert, NØQIX, and Kirk Nelson, WL7CLI, joined in to congratulate Nolan soon after.

Nolan is the only one of his friends who hold an FCC amateur radio license – part of a demographic that is stereotypically older men. But in everyday life, he's an energetic 9-year-old student whose favorite class is gym, and likes to play dodgeball, football and soccer.

It's no secret to his friends that he's an amateur radio operator. He's fielded

questions from friends who hang out at his house on Wednesday mornings when school starts later, asking about Nolan's new hobby.

"They ask me questions about the radio, what I can do on there," Nolan said.

So far, Nolan's staying active on the radio. He volunteered at the Easter Seals Rowing Regatta this summer as his first ARES event, and

he regularly checks into the local weekly nets.

Nolan said he's enjoying his new hobby, and Brad sees some possible DX contesting in Nolan's future. Until then, his father and Mike Blaser, KCØMTE, will keep encouraging him to learn more about the hobby and upgrade his license as he gets older.



home. He goes into the ULS. All of a sudden his mom hears him from the other room, screaming, jumping up and down. 'It's in there! It's in there!'" he said, referring to his callsign in the database.

"We were trying to figure out what 'LJO' stood for, it means 'loud jumping object!" Brad said.

It wasn't too long after his discovery before he hopped on a repeater to make



Judge Rules a Radio is not a Cell Phone

In many states and localities, it is illegal to talk on a cell phone (without a hands-free device) while behind the wheel -- doing so can result in a ticket and possibly a large fine. But on May 30, 2010, when a New York ham was talking on his mobile rig, he didn't think he was doing anything wrong. Except that the officer who pulled him over and cited him with a \$100 fine didn't quite see it that way.

Steve Bozak, WB2IQU, of Clifton Park, told the ARRL that when he was pulled over while driving to Troy -- about 16 miles away -- he assured the officer that he was not speaking on a cell phone, but on his handheld transceiver. But according to Bozak, the officer said "it was all the same to him." So Bozak decided to fight the ticket in court.

"Honestly, it's not the fine or the ticket, but that all the other hams who use mobile radios have to hide the fact we are mobile in Troy," he told the ARRL just days after he was cited. "I will do my best to settle this politely and correctly, for all of the ham community. So I will follow the course and have my day in court, to 'tell it to the judge.' This matter affects 38,000 hams in New York State."

Unfortunately, when Bozak had his day in court for a pre-trial conference, the prosecutor refused to dismiss the case. But he didn't give up and took his case to City Court where, on September 8, where at the request of Bozak's attorney -- ARRL Volunteer Counsel (VC) Jeremy, Rase, KC2JRD -- the judge dismissed the case in Bozak's favor. Bozak argued that his use "of a handheld Amateur Radio does not fit the definition of a mobile telephone, and as such, the present charge should be dismissed." The prosecutor's office did not submit a response in opposition.

Saying that New York's Vehicle and Traffic Law defines a "Mobile Telephone" as a "device used by subscribers and other users of wireless telephone service to access such service," and that a "Wireless Telephone Service" is defined as "two-way real time voice telecommunications service that is interconnected to a public switched telephone network and is provided by a commercial mobile radio service," the judge decided

that Bozak's handheld transceiver did not fit that description.

"A review of 47 C.F.R.\\$20.3 reveals that Citizens Band Radio Service is defined under private mobile radio service not commercial mobile radio service," the decision read. "Therefore, the Court finds that the use of an Amateur Radio device does not fit the definition of a mobile telephone as defined under the Vehicle and Traffic Law" As such, the judge dismissed the case in Bozak's favor.

"While the court cited the Citizens Band Service instead of the Amateur Radio Service, the ruling very is favorable to amateurs on the precise point of law raised," said ARRL Regulatory Information Manager Dan Hender-

son, N1ND. "The principle of law is spot on. This is a great ruling in New York and exactly what we had thought would happen."

- Iowa multi-op Fixed
- Iowa multi-op Mobile
- Top number of counties worked Club High Score

Scoring:

QSO Points - Each complete, non-duplicate phone is worth one point per band. Each complete, non-duplicate CW or Digital contact is worth two points. Duplicate contacts are worth zero points. A station may be worked ONCE per MODE (1 cw or digital and 1 phone) per band. Mobiles may be worked once per mode per band per county.

General:

• Spotting - Spotting on the packet clusters or via internet is permissible,

including self-spotting.

- All stations are limited to output power of no more than 125 watts.
- Mobile Iowa stations who change counties are considered to be a new station in each new county.
- Mobile stations may park on a county line but each county must be worked in a separate contact.
- To count as a mobile station, stations must be in a vehicle capable of being in motion under its own power.
- Mobile stations should identify either /county or /m
 Known Available Iowa QSO Party Software N1MM logging software,
 www.NO5W.com, and Writelog.com.
 There may be others but these are the ones we are aware of at this time.

The nominee of the winner will be notified

by April 5, 2011.

The official presentation and announcement of the award will be at the DMRAA Hamfest in Des Moines, Iowa, on April 23, 2011.

Additional Information:

Although all accomplishments and activities will be considered, the concentration should be on those activities that took place within the past calendar year, and it should be noted when each activity occurred.

The judges will select an award recipient based on their involvement in ham radio, especially community service, promotion, operating, technical knowledge, and enthusiasm. All decisions of the judges are final.
